二、课程概述

This is a core strategic management course that surveys the most influential and classic works in strategy area. The course will also cover economics, sociology and psychology views of strategic management, providing a basic understanding of strategy theories. This course should be approached as an opportunity to gain exposure to the entire field. Having said that, certain topics that are addressed in detail in future core and elective courses in strategy area will not be covered.

十、课程学习要求及课堂纪律规范

The readings assigned for the week are listed in the syllabus and should be completed prior to class. Each student should attend the class and participate in the class discussion.

十一、学生成绩评定办法(需详细说明评估学生学习效果的方法)

Class Preparation and Participation (20% of grade) - Each participant is required to come prepared to class. Since class discussion is an integral part of the course, absences and lack of preparedness are unacceptable. All students are required to read all chapters and articles assigned on the syllabus.

Article Journals (20% of grade) - In addition to the assigned reading, all students are required to prepare a journal that summarizes their preparation for each class. This journal should contain three components for each topic:

- A summary of important ideas, concepts, theories, models, methods, results, and
 conclusions for each reading. One to two pages should be devoted to each reading.
 Keeping notes on articles that you read is an excellent habit to establish that will save
 you time and energy in the future. Including copies of any summary models or
 tables in the journal will help refresh your memory of the article as you go back to it
 in the future.
- 2. An evaluative statement of the literature. This statement should address key strengths (contributions) as well as weaknesses in the readings for the week. This discussion should be approximately one page.
- 3. An extension statement that outlines no more than one or two future theoretical and/or empirical directions for each topic. This statement should be specific and creative and should flow from the evaluation statement. You should develop these hypotheses using the theory from the week and describe in some detail the methodology that you would use to test them.

Students are often asked to share their ideas from their journals during class. Journals should be brought to each class. I will collect the journals on the last day of the course for grading and feedback; however, on any given week, journal entries may be collected, so be sure to keep up and bring your journals to class.

Individual Term Paper (60% of grade) - All students are required to prepare a proposal that relates a topic(s) covered in class to their own research interests. This proposal may be a valuable start on the student's summer research project, it may identify a general area of interest,

or it may eliminate a topic from the student's potential set of interests. The evaluative and extension statements from your journals are a good place to develop ideas for this proposal.

The term paper should follow the following logical steps: (1) define a research question, (2) review and critique the extant literature, (3) develop a few testable hypotheses, (4) propose a data source and methods for testing the proposed hypotheses, and (5) discuss the implications and extensions of your research. Each paper should be written in the form of the front end of an empirical journal article.

In our last session participants will present their research paper to others in the class. The presentation will follow the format of an Academy of Management presentation and will be about 15-20 minutes in length. Final proposals are due no later than Jan. 1. No late papers are accepted. Your final grade will reflect your paper and your presentation
